Dear Ms Sharkie,

I am writing on behalf of Allied Health Professions Australia (AHPA) and the broader allied health sector to ask you to consider an important, practical change to the Aged Care Amendment (Staffing Ratio Disclosure) Bill 2018 that you have sponsored. That change consists of an expanded categorisation of the different allied health professions under Section 9-3C(5) in order to support a meaningful report on their relative staffing levels.

AHPA is very supportive of the Aged Care Amendment Bill and the intention to increase the ability for older Australians and their families to make informed decisions about aged care. Our submission to the recent parliamentary inquiry detailed our support while also providing practical, constructive commentary to improve the effectiveness of the planned Bill. While we were pleased to see reference to our commentary in the report, we were disappointed that the recommendations did not integrate our suggestions. In particular we are concerned that the recommendation was that the reporting categories were only revisited in 12 months time.

It is our firm belief that grouping the diverse range of allied health professions into a single category will not improve the older Australians' ability to understand their level of access to services that they may require. Instead it may in fact have the opposite effect—it may lead consumers to believe that they will be able to access services that are not in fact available. An example of this might be a facility that has a speech pathologist and a dietitian on staff but no physiotherapist. In this case the consumer would have no access to rehabilitative, physical care.

We argue that the individual allied health professions are highly distinct, much more so than some of the other categories identified in the Bill. As such we strongly argue that this change to Section 9-3C(5) is very necessary. We note that this view was supported by the Australian Medical Association and the Australian College of Geriatric Medicine in their own submissions to the Inquiry.

I thank you for your support of older Australians and the allied health aged care workforce that provides vital services to them. I am confident that this Bill, with small changes, will provide a valuable increase in transparency and an improved ability for older people and their families to make informed decisions about residential aged care.
